


The Aesthetic-Usability Effect




Users are more tolerant of minor usability issues when they find an interface visually appealing.




High Usability Score and

High Beauty Score (No.23)




Low Usability Score and
Low Beauty Score (No.17)




Low Usability Score and

- experiment from 90'
- 26 variations of an ATM interfaces
- 252 study participants

In 1995, Japanese researchers, Masaaki Kurosu and Kaori Kashimura, from Hitachi Design Center did a famous ATM test.




Kurosu and Kashimura concluded that users are strongly influenced by the aesthetics of any given interface.





- Noam Tractinsky repeated the experiment
- Not sold on the Japanese experiment
- The results were even stronger in Israeli






If designers care mostly about usability, they still need to make their designs look good.






